

Dear Friends,

As we enter December the dark nights of winter are now upon us and many of us will say 'I don't like these dark nights!'

In the dark our fears grow, our imaginations run riot and as a child we can perhaps remember that spine tingling moment when you are convinced you hear footsteps on the landing or picture a monster under the bed! Growing up in a creaky old farmhouse I confess to often hiding under the bed clothes and holding my breath just in case my worst fears were realised!

In the bible darkness also evoked a sense of fear and impending doom. It became symbolic for wrongdoing, depravity, trouble and affliction. A time when people had misplaced their moral compass, lost direction and had given up all hope of a better day to come. God's people certainly experienced such times which came to a head when they were conquered and taken off into exile.

But it is into this dark situation that the prophet speaks and brings hope:

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned... (Isaiah 9.2)

The light he speaks about is the coming Messiah, the one who will bring about a new age.



For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be upon his shoulders.

And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. (Isaiah 9.6) As we make our journey through advent, we will light a candle each Sunday to re-live that growing expectation that Jesus the Saviour is born, the one who brings us love, peace, joy and hope even in the darkest of days.

Harvest Thanksgiving


I am pleased to report that church members gave £251.25 (including Gift Aid) to All We Can from the collections at harvest Thanksgiving. Thank you. Graham



Since the outbreak of the pandemic, the number of passengers on rail, bus, trams and metro networks has declined significantly – and even as restrictions have eased, passenger numbers remain far below pre-lockdown levels. As a result, much of public transport became unviable overnight, leaving most sectors dependent on councils and central government paying for services. There is subsequently major uncertainty around the demand for travel and changing patterns of usage, leading to concern at all levels of government about the viability of current infrastructure and the sustainability of current transport projects. As emergency funding comes to an end, there will need to be a renewed focus on ensuring that public transport budgets are effectively targeted to meet chaining needs and that the public are assured that buses and trains are safe to use. This is not just a financial issue for all levels of government, the use of public transport is also key to meeting the government's carbon emission targets, improving air quality and public health.

- Develop methods of supporting people with disabilities seeking spontaneous travel

Tide, Wave, Wind and Nuclear.

We are surrounded by energy waiting for us to harvest it. Wind and Solar are the obvious sources already being exploited.



There are also parts of the British Isles which can be a rich source of power from the sea. Major barrages across river mouths such as the Severn are very controversial. But tidal power does not have to be that large. The Orkney Islands are being used as a test bed for marine technology which should have its place in our overall scheme for renewable energy.

If you take yourself to the south of the island of Eday, you might spot a yellow floating platform. The fast flowing tide in the Fall of Warness is rushing past it creating a wake as though the platform were moving. However, it is tethered to the sea bottom and contains two turbines converting the tidal flow into electricity. The power is only 1.5 MW but it is a sign of what is possible when scaled up. It is not the only such demonstration going ahead in the Orkneys. Couple that with on-shore and off-shore wind and the electrolytic converters which turn electricity into 'green' hydrogen and the area offers a whole range of options. This is all a part of the European Marine Energy Centre which is transforming the area into a global leader in marine renewable power.

More good news is the Government investment in development of small nuclear power stations. Based on the Rolls-Royce compact nuclear reactors used in UK nuclear submarines for years, these are proven technology and are small enough to be installed locally.
