Dear Friends,

I enjoy growing pumpkins on the allotment. They do however require lots of space to sprawl across the ground. They also like a long hot growing season for the fruits to grow to a good size and ripen fully. As summer turns towards autumn the joy comes in seeing the foliage die back leaving one or two large balls of orange fruit to pick before the first frosts and store for winter.



Traditionally adults and children have enjoyed gouging out the middles and carving scary faces onto pumpkins as part of their Halloween decorations. These scary candle-lit faces (which used to be carved from turnips) are supposed to ward off evil spirits, ghosts, ghoulies and all those things that go

bump in the night - according to the ancient Celtic festival, *Samhain*, as summer finally gives way to the dark nights of winter. It is also known as Halloween (All Hallows Eve) – the night before All Saints Day.

All Saints Day really does give us a reason to remember and celebrate those many saints of old, both known and unknown, who have been a blessing to others throughout their lives. Courageous and faithful Christians like St. Peter and St. Paul who gave their lives following Jesus and sharing their faith in word and deed. Inspirational believers like St Francis of Assisi who renounced his wealth and chose to live a life of simplicity, serving the poor, writing poems and communing with nature. Also gifted theologians like St. Thomas Aquinas who shaped Christian thinking on faith, reason and the nature of God.

All Saints Day (Nov 1st) and All Souls Day (Nov 2nd) give us opportunity to commemorate *all* the faithfully departed. To pause and remember on a personal note, those we have loved and shared life with us and to quietly give thanks for the privilege and joy of their company.


Candles of Remembrance Service Sunday November 2nd at 4pm Alton Methodist Church

Naomi House & Jacksplace supports children, young adults and their families from across central southern England. Here is one story about the work that they do.



In 2021, when he was just one year old, Thomas was diagnosed with a childhood cancer and a rare neurological condition. Thomas and his family were cared for by Naomi House & Jacksplace, as Thomas came to the end of his life.

Before his disease, we knew Thomas as a very happy little boy who would laugh when others were laughing, even if he didn't understand what they were laughing about. He loved to

play with balls, and join in with his older brother and sister, Raphaël and Sofia, if they were playing with bricks or reading a story. Thomas started to show strange behaviours when he was around 11 months old. It was quite difficult to know whether anything was wrong or whether it was just part of his development. A few days after his first birthday, real symptoms appeared. He started to have uncontrollable movement of his eyes and problems with his coordination and balance. The hospital did lots of tests and we were told that Thomas had a tumour mostly affecting young children.

Our community nurse kept saying how wonderful Naomi House & Jacksplace was, so we arranged to go for a visit before we made up our minds. Thomas and his family were cared for until eventually he died.

Everyone at Naomi House has been so kind. The doctors and nurses answered all our questions with gentle voices, they always had the right words to say and nothing was a problem for them.

Youth Clubs in Decline?

At the beginning of this October, the NEC in Birmingham was buzzing with energy, laughter, and the sound of over 1,800 children and young people feeling right at home.

3Generate 2025 – Journey of a Lifetime – was a beautiful reminder of what's possible when we create participatory space for young people to belong, be heard, and be themselves.

One young person said: "Coming to 3Generate was a great opportunity for me to strengthen my faith and strengthen my connection with God and find other like-minded Christians. Young people who thought and felt the same way as me... it's been really special."

In light of John Harris' article in <u>The Guardian from 12th October 2025</u>, highlighting the decline of youth clubs in Britain as a direct result of austerity measures, 3Generate felt especially significant. The article paints a sobering picture: the erosion of safe, informal spaces where young people can build relationships with adults who aren't their parents or teachers, and with peers outside of social media. Harris argues that these spaces are vital for bridging divides, building confidence, supporting emotional and mental wellbeing and developing a sense of community.

And yet, this is precisely what church youth work – at its best – can offer, and what Methodists have offered for years. In fact, the Methodist Church could be described as a cradle of youth work, and it continues to be an important contributor. Whether it is a large scale event such as 3Generate or a small weekly gathering of a handful of teenagers sharing stories and playing games together, these "small and deep" places matter. Here, young people are known by name, they are encouraged to discuss probing questions, and they can meet adults who listen to them without judgement but with lots of care.

Of course, not every local church can offer such a space. There is a general fatigue across the Connexion, and people are simply exhausted. But this is important work, and – as the article points out – it is urgent. So, even if our church is not in the position to set up a youth club, the question remains: how can we step into the gap and be there for our young generation?

- Could we offer a weekly drop-in? With hot drinks, snacks and a listening ear?
- Could we partner with local schools, uniformed groups and other community groups to offer pastoral support?

Could we ask young people and listen to what they need?

Church youth work is not a luxury – it's a necessity. In a world that can feel fragmented, confusing, and overwhelming, our churches can be places of healing, belonging, and joy.
