

#### Dear Friends,

This month we celebrate our Church Anniversary (July 17<sup>th</sup>).

We can look back and give thanks for those who bravely shared the Christian message in and around Alton in the early 19<sup>th</sup> century.

One travelling Primitive Methodist preacher Miss Elizabeth Smith endured relative persecution; At one place a number of young men strung rats to a stick which they dangled before her face as she preached but this did not stop her delivering her message, for closing her eyes, she spoke with even greater earnestness and effect.

Several attempts were made to start a Methodist presence within this 'very dark part of the country' without much success. Rev. Isaac Harding made a visit from Guildford in 1840 and preached in the Market Square – but he was stoned out of town!

It was not until 1842 that a young probationer minister began to reap rewards for his labour and the following year two services were established every Sunday, meeting in various places from a cottage to a hop kiln. A good site for a Chapel was eventually acquired in August 1845 along the High Street.

We also remember those who have worked so hard in more recent years to develop our present building and make it an inviting, attractive and practical place to be church.

So, take a moment to look back and give thanks for those whose faith, commitment, generosity, and perseverance have gone before us.

Church Anniversary is also a time to be thankful for the present. We are grateful that following Covid and lockdowns that we can meet and gather together once more.

It is an occasion to appreciate those who give so much of their time, their energy, and their gifts to provide so many opportunities for us to meet together and support one another.

We are grateful for those who lead worship, facilitate services, run coffee mornings, and support the likes of Foodbank, Contact Centre, CAP etc. We can be thankful for the huge amount of commitment and planning that goes into running Girls' and Boys' Brigades as well as DofE & Messy Church. We appreciate those who run the house group and many who support one another as Church Family Visitors. And it is great that a good number of our congregation are involved in the community, for example working on the Town Council.

So, as we go into the future, let us continue the good work, always open to the direction God might be leading and faithfully living out our calling to be followers of Christ.

As Methodist members we commit ourselves to worship, learning and caring, service and evangelism seeking to be a blessing both within and beyond God's church.

But as you can read elsewhere, these efforts combined with all the other efforts throughout the year, helped the company achieve third place in the Battalion trophy, which is very good. Well done boys.

#### **Company Section**

The Company is now into its Summer Programme of activities with the boys meeting on Friday evenings but with BB uniform not needed. So far we have enjoyed playing some games in the evening sunshine at The Butts, playing Laser Quest in Woking and playing some wide games down on Shortheath Common on a very warm evening.

On Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> June, we took a minibus of boys to the Guildford Spectrum athletics stadium for our Battalion Sports Day. Fearing a day of energysapping heat in the bowl that is the athletics track, instead the boys experienced warm, overcast conditions with frequent light showers and a chilly breeze at times, which for sporting purposes was preferable. This was the

first such event since 2019, it was great to meet up with other Companies of the Battalion to compete in track, field and novelty events. Boys from all fours sections of our Company took part: Anchors, Juniors, Company and Seniors. A highlight was one of our boys winning the Company Section 1500 metres, doing so by some margin. We also achieved a magnificent Third Place finish in the Company 4 x 100m relay, for which we had to draft in one of the younger Junior boys to run the final leg to make up our team. Overall, our Company finished third in the Sports Day standings.

The points awarded for the Sports Day were added to the ongoing Battalion Trophy tallies to produce the final result for that annual competition. Our Company finished in a creditable Third Place, with the Fleet Company being this year's winners.

In the coming weeks the Summer Programme continues with a trip to the Coral Reef leisure swimming pool in Bracknell, a behind-the-scenes visit to Alton Sainsbury's, an evening learning about some Bushcraft techniques and a trip to the High Score Arcade in Farnborough to play on old school Space Invader machines. Our final meeting, for which we hope for good weather, is a walk from Lasham back to Alton, followed by a barbeque.

I think it worth acknowledging the considerable commitment made by our leaders in running our activities throughout the year, and particularly during the summer programme when they often provide transport for boys to and from activities away from the church. Some must also suffer the indignity of being ambushed by boys during Laser Quest battles.

From late July until September there will be a break in our meetings during the school summer holidays. However, some of our boys and leaders will be participating in a joint summer camp with the 1<sup>st</sup> Woodley Company, under canvas for a week in mid-August at Southend in Essex.

We ask for your prayers of support in all our endeavours, and especially for a successful and enjoyable summer camping experience. In turn, we pray the Lord's blessings for you during the summer months wherever and however you may be spending this time. As always we pray that all we do for and with the boys meets with the approval of our Lord Jesus Christ, whom we seek to serve. Amen.

In the last month we have held our first Camp in two years. As our numbers are down, rather than going further afield, we held it at our Church in Alton.

On the Monday we arrived at Church with 6 girls, had our lunch and unpacked. In the afternoon we painted pottery mugs from Dolly Pots with coloured glazes. The wealth of artistic abilities revealed was astounding! Most



designs were either animal or Jubilee related and have since been fired and they look wonderful as you can see. Then it was off on a brisk walk round Kings Pond between showers to work up an appetite for Gill's scrumptious dinner.

Three extra girls joined us for the day on Tuesday and the highlight of Camp – a trip to Alice Holt Forest including Go-Ape!

We parked up at our booked shelter and set off for a walk through the forest, navigating from one play feature to another. We took shelter under the trees during a shower and took the opportunity to look for a stick as long as a finger, a leaf as long as a thumbjoint and an unexpected item. By the time we returned to our shelter for a picnic lunch the sun was shining again and a host of jackets were hung out to dry.



During lunch anticipation was rising about the afternoon's challenge of Go-Ape, with some nerves too. However, the instructor was an expert at allaying fears with her demonstration of how safe the girls would be, attached by harness to an overhead wire at all times, and all girls set off on the aerial course through the tree canopy in high spirits. It was wonderful to see the increasing confidence of the girls as they made their way over swaying rope

bridges between the trees. But then the rain came on again, then thunder and even some lightening, so the order went out to exit the course. At the time it was quite a challenge for those a long way from the exit to keep their nerve, but they'll all have quite a tale to tell—and no exaggeration needed!



During our Camp we used the devotions from Girls' Brigade who have been working with HOPE Together, Boys' Brigade, the Church of England, Pais, Youth for Christ, Youthscape, The Message, and Prayer Spaces In Schools to put together a great range of resources for in uniformed organisations, schools, and youth organisations.

On Wednesday we had a morning of craft, devotions and awards where everyone received a medal & GB 2022 Platinum Jubilee Badge. A lovely time was had by all and it was good to have a bite-sized Camp nearer to home. So where are we going next year.....watch this space!

#### **Online Services**

Ever since Covid struck and lockdown occurred in March 2020 a small team have produced online services which we know from anecdotal evidence have been watched and enjoyed from many places around the country and beyond - people from the Isle of Wight, Devon, Lincolnshire and beyond! Viewer numbers during the pandemic were often up to 150-250 with those not usually attending church telling us they were watching.

The production of such services was a steep learning curve in the early days and to film, edit and produce recorded worship in its present style still takes a day/half a day – on top of the preparation of materials – and all recorded on a mobile phone!

For the last few months, we have produced a circuit wide service reliant on the skills of Julie Clarke from Fleet to produce and edit 50% of our services. Julie is leaving us to be trained as a Methodist Minister in the summer.

We are especially indebted to Liz George who has also played a huge part in the leading, production and editing of our online services to a very high standard. Others have also learnt the skills – like Pam Jones and Liam Sheridan.

During July and August, we have decided to take a break recognising that some of our folk continue to watch the service (about 20-30 views each week). We will re-evaluate for the autumn months and perhaps explore different options for having an online presence and enabling those less able to join in person and continue to feel a valued part of our worship – so look out for that!

#### **Eco Corner - Electric heating**

I am on a 'green' energy tariff, so I can feel good about that. However, my house is all electric and even before the major price rises, the electric heating costs were much higher than they would have been with gas, so I don't feel too good about that.

I had a smart meter installed so that I could keep an eye on electricity use and costs.



Nationally, only 3% of people have only electric heating. However, as with a number of Alton residents, I live in a retirement development with Night Storage Heaters on an 'Economy 7' tariff. With an eye on electricity costs, I replaced the old inefficient storage heaters with higher efficiency modern ones which do not leak much heat over night and retain enough heat to keep me warm in the evenings.

My house switches over to the night rate of Economy 7 from midnight to 7 am and my heaters are timed to charge themselves up during the same period. My Smart Meter display sets itself to zero at midnight so when I read it at 8 o'clock in the morning it tells me how much I have paid for the stored heat that day. In the winter, the heating cost exceeds the cost of electricity used during the rest of the day by about eight times. The effect of reducing the number of heaters switched on, or lowering of temperature settings, is very obvious from the changes in the Smart Meter reading each morning.

Cooking is the biggest element in daytime cost. Kettles, toasters and ovens are heavy users of electricity. Microwave ovens use far less energy than conventional ovens and induction hobs are probably more efficient than conventional electric hobs. (They are also much easier to keep clean!)

Keen 'Masterchefs' will hate me for saying this, but microwaved food will save you energy. Only boiling the water you need, rather than a full kettle can also help.
