# Dear Friends,

I was doing Collective Worship (school assembly) at St Lawrence Church School this month when they concluded the service by singing the song *'This is amazing grace'* – a hundred young voices singing with such enjoyment was truly wonderful to hear!

It set me thinking about the word 'Grace' and its many different meanings.

For some people - **Grace is a prayer** that we say before meals' – as one child prayed 'Dear God, please make this broccoli taste like chocolate!' (Amen!)

For others – **Grace may be a title** that you use to address royalty, nobility or even clergy – whenever I went to Hale Chapel to take a service, I was often greeted tongue in cheek with the words 'Welcome your grace!' (the late Pete Wisby)

On Strictly Come Dancing, the judges may ask the contestants to **dance with** a little more grace - lightly, elegantly, effortlessly.

When we are short of money and have a big bill to pay, I may be given a **grace period** in which to pay – meaning a little extra time.

Those who are musical among us will be aware that in a music score there can be 'grace notes' which I think are small extra notes that add an extra twiddle and pizazz to the tune!

And I am sure that we all hope that we will aim to **grow old gracefully** – meaning that we will become even more kind, compassionate, understanding and content!

There are so many different meanings to the word grace, but the children in school were singing about 'amazing grace'.

And in the context of our Christian faith this form of grace is speaking about a gift from God that is given freely, generously and that is totally unde-

### served.

The story I was asked to tell at that Collective Worship was that of the Prodigal Son.

A father had two sons, and he loved them both equally, even though they were so different in character. Like most farmers it was probably his hope and intention that they would follow in his footsteps and inherit the farm, but the younger son had different ideas. He grew restless and wanted to leave home. Going to his father he demanded that he have his share of his inheritance NOW!

The son went off into a far-off country where he lived a wild life, and wasted his inheritance. It was only when he was penniless and left feeding pigs in order to survive that he 'came to his senses'.

In a state of regret at how his life had turned out he wondered if his father might take him back just as a servant if he made his return. He knew that he didn't deserve anything.

And yet as he nears home, his father sees him coming. He tucks his coat into his belt and he runs towards his wayward son and throws his arms around him and welcomes him home – a beautiful picture of God's amazing grace, undeserved kindness!


I don't know about the children, but I came home singing the lyrics to their song!

hospices for children and young adults

It was lovely to meet with Karen Sanderson (Chief Fundraiser) for Naomi House & Jacksplace at the Tuesday Coffee Morning in September.

Karen was delighted that we had chosen to support their charity as a church community over the coming year.

She gave lots of ideas for fundraisers for all ages including the likes of Cameo, Boys' & Girls' Brigade and the church fam-

ily. She also offered a small group tour of the hospice for two or three people which we hope to take up shortly. Karen has arranged to come and speak at Cameo in the new year and would be happy to speak with BB & GB groups to help them to learn about their work and inspire them to do a fundraiser.

# This is Charlie's story, told by his mum Dee.

From birth we have always called him Cheeky Charlie. He's just got the most beautiful cheeky personality. He's adorable and laughs at all the things that he shouldn't laugh at! We gave him that name when he was a couple of days old and he has grown up with it. It suits him to a tee. When Charlie's not poorly he's just the most fantastic, happy child to be around and he's always smiling and laughing.



Charlie wasn't breathing when he was delivered after an emergency caesarean. He was resuscitated before being placed in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) under one of the cooling blankets. We were told that Charlie had widespread brain damage and it was made clear to us that we probably wouldn't be taking him home.



There came a point when all the machines had to be turned off and we were to say our goodbyes. But we waited and waited and he just carried on breathing. During that first night we were convinced that we were going to lose him, but by the next day he was still going. He was a little fighter.

Although Charlie loves food, he can only eat small amounts and so he is fed via a tube directly into his stomach. He can see light and dark and the different colours,

but he is registered blind; and beyond that we're not entirely sure. We have to do everything for Charlie, 24 hours a day. He has epilepsy, and very severe dystonia, which is a movement disorder, and because of that he finds it very difficult to sleep unless he has medication.

Charlie has scoliosis and because of his dystonia, he's had hip surgery three times. We are hoping that once he is fully grown it might not be such an issue. He really does have a tough time and I think he is a lesson to us all on how not to moan about the smallest things in life. I think it has changed the type of people we are and our whole outlook on everything. We always see the positives in Charlie.

Early in 2024, Charlie had the metal plates from previous surgery removed from his hips. A major challenge for Charlie is that his dystonia is severely triggered by pain, so to help manage this after his surgery, he had a symptom management stay at Naomi House & Jacksplace. The team monitored his pain and the hospice doctors, Dr Tim Warlow and Dr Kate Renton, wrote a symptom management plan to increase his medication as he needed it. This is something that we can't do at home and being at Naomi House & Jacksplace made his recovery much quicker. There have been times when we've been discharged from hospital and then found ourselves trying to get him admitted again because he is in so much pain.

It's harder to manage Charlie at home after his surgery. You need an extra pair of hands to move him and if you try to do it on your own, you might hurt him. At Naomi House & Jacksplace they've got those extra pairs of hands.

# **Eco Corner - Going Circular**

Steel making has underpinned the industrial revolution at the cost of releasing large quantities of CO2 into the atmosphere. I remember learning about steel making using blast furnaces when I was at school. We visited a steel works and were shown large quantities of red-hot coke being pushed out of the



large quantities of red-hot coke being pushed out of the coke ovens. This had, of course been made from coal.

Now, the steel industry in the UK requires government support which will be used in part to aid a transition to electric arc furnaces which produce much less CO2 than blast furnaces. The snag is that this only makes sense if there is ample cheap green electricity available.

However, assuming that this all goes ahead, there is the possibility that scrap steel can be fed into the electric arc furnaces where it can be recycled into clean steel. there this could ultimately create a circular process, where the same steel is continuously being recycled.

The remaining problem is that the demand for steel for buildings, transport systems etc is steadily growing. Apparently, the controversial plans for new or extended runways at Heathrow and Gatwick, including the changes to terminal buildings will require large amounts of steel. However, new, high-grade and specialty steels can also be made in an electric arc furnace by managing the raw material mix.

Steel making has come a long way since the industrial revolution. With care its production can go greener but, as with so many things, much depends on the availability and cost of green electricity.


